
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
YELLOW SPARKS TUNE-UP ARTICLE



THE POINTS should spark when opened and closed with a screwdriver with the ignition switch on. No spark, no electricity.



IF THE SPARKS are yellow, not a healthy blue-white capable of snapping over a ¼-in. air gap, they will soon give over on firing the plugs. This leaves you stranded by the side of the road or, more likely, sitting in your own driveway with a car that won't start. In either case, you (or some expensive service technician) will indeed wonder where

they went.


The first thing to do in either case is keep your cool. If the car dies when you're driving, try to coast to a safe stopping place. If it refuses to start, quit trying before you run the battery completely flat. In either case, a couple of quick checks will tell you whether your trouble is fuel or ignition.

Is there gas in the tank? In the carb? Check by pulling off the air cleaner and watching while someone works the accelerator pedal. You should smell and see the jet of fuel from the accelerator pump. If you didn't goof and run out, chances are the fuel system will be okay.

Lack of sparks is more apt to cause sudden failure. With a modicum of luck plus a little know-how, you should be able to find the missing sparks and get going again.

If the car died suddenly and mysteriously on the road, try double checking the bulk-head connector plug. This is a plug on the firewall of the engine compartment where all the wires from the front of the car go through to the switches. Sometimes it will jiggle loose, thus killing the engine.

If this doesn't do it, or if the car simply won't start despite having gas in the carb, trace down the electrical trouble systematically.




COIL LEAD from the ignition switch should be live whenever the key is turned on. If not, check switch, wiring and ballast.

Start at the plugs and work back. Pull a high tension lead from a conveniently located plug. Insert a small bolt, and hold it near a clean ground by the rubber insulating boot. If you get too close to the bolt, you can give yourself quite a shock. Have a helper crank the engine. There should be a fat, snappy bluishwhite spark between the bolt and the ground.


If you've got the spark and fuel but the engine won't run, the plugs are not firing. Take one out and look at it. If it's wet, fuel may have shorted it out, the plug may be worn out or it could be fouled. How long has it been in use? If you've gotten 15,000 or more miles service, replace the complete set. This should cure the problem.

No spark at the plug is the more probable cause of your trouble. If this is the case, put back the plug wire and check the fat wire coming out of the coil by holding the distributor end near a ground, cranking the engine and looking for sparks. A spark here means that the trouble has to be in the distributor cap, rotor, or spark plug wires.

Pop the distributor cap and look it over carefully. Any trace of cracking or a wiggly carbon line caused by tracking calls for replacement. To replace the cap, get the new one and then transfer one wire at a time from the old to the

new so you cannot get them mixed up.
The rotor should stand the same inspection as the cap. The end should be
clean and the spring should make good
contact with the center terminal in the
cap. If you decide to replace either the

rotor or the cap, it's a good idea to replace both together with spares of the same make. This insures correct clearances and should make the engine run.

No spark at the secondary (fat wire) from the coil means that the trouble has to be in the primary circuit. This includes the battery, ignition switch, ballast resistor, coil, points, condenser and connecting wires.


As with the secondary circuit, check the primary from the end to the beginning. Start with the points. Bump the engine on the starter with the distributor cap removed until you can see the points are closed. Leave the switch on and open the points with a screwdriver blade. You should see bluish sparks. No sparks, no juice. Take a look—a close look—at the points themselves. Are they pitted, blue and generally cruddy looking? Do they open to the recommended gap? If they've been in use for 10,000 to 15,000 miles or if they look bad, replace them.

For this job and further checking, you'll need information and a few tools. The info comes from the shop manual for your car. Tools include a few wrenches, screwdrivers, circuit test lamp and feeler gauge set. Allowing \$5 for the manual, another \$5 should cover the rest of the stuff on a minimal basis.


The condenser could short out. If it does, you'll see no spark at the points. Test it by removing the little can from the distributor leaving the wire to the points in place. Hold it away from a ground. If the points now spark, you have a shorted condenser. Replace it.

Replacing points calls for a certain amount of know-how, but it's not difficult. The manual shows how the parts fit. You'll also need to set the gap and time the engine.


First clean the new points to remove preservative from the contacts. Wipe with paper and solvent. Follow instructions and put the parts in place of the old set. Common practice calls for replacing the condenser at the same time whether it needs it or not. Put a light smear of grease on the distributor cam, and a drop of [Continued on page 119]

oil on the pivot to lubricate the arm.

Set the gap with the rubbing block right on the peak of a cam point. The manual will tell you how and give diagrams. You'll need a feeler gauge or dwell meter to do it.

With the gap correct, you now must set the timing. Your test light will enable you to do this statically but you'll need a timing light to do it with the engine running. Refer to shop manual for procedure.

A service station can time your engine quickly, accurately and inexpensively.

New points and condenser correctly installed, but still no spark? Your test light can spot remaining trouble sources quickly. Is current coming to the distributor from the coil? Check the wire both at the distributor and the coil. Then check the wire on the coil from the ignition switch. If there's current here but none at the other small wire, replace the coil.

No current coming to the coil? Check the ballast resister at both ends. If it burns out, the effect is the same as turning off the switch. If it's good, work back to the ignition switch itself. Check the wire coming in and then the wire coming out with the switch on. Replace a bad switch.

Assuming the starter turns, your battery should be all right. Using the wiring diagram in the manual, work back to the voltage regulator and to the battery to find electricity to light your test lamp.

Fix the broken wire or corroded connection and your engine has to start. If it doesn't, your problem cannot be in the ignition system.

Following this systematic check-out will take you to the cause of electrical trouble

with a minimum of effort. The trick is to work back until you find the missing sparks. It can be deceiving because a tired system may have more than one trouble. Take everything in order and you'll have done a thorough electrical tune-up as you tracked down the missing sparks. Now they should stay on the job for many thousands of miles. •

Big Wheels

I like to change wheels and tires. Upgrading a car this way is fairly easy, it's literally a bolt-on, and does not require any modification of the car. This can improve appearance, or performance, or both. I have collected way too many wheels and tires for my cars.

Fuchs wheels (the best!) for the old Porsche 911, with new-manufactured Pirelli CN36 tires; BBS lace wheels for the old Audis; Kelsey-Hayes wire wheels (with Sears tires) for my early Corvair; Mahle, Panasport, ATS, all good brands; I used to have weld-widened steel Stinger rims and alloy Firebird wheels and every kind of old "mag" custom wheels from the 1960s. Too many. I have three complete wheel/tire sets for the Devin, plus a spare; is that excessive for a car I drive only a few hundred miles a year? I also own too many pairs of shoes, but that's a different fetish.

Sometimes we change to improve, and sometimes we change because sizes go in and out of fashion. Wheels have changed a lot in the history of the automobile. In the horseless carriage era, wheels were very tall and tires very narrow. Through the early 20th century the wheels got smaller and the tires got bigger, this made for a smoother ride because tire sidewalls are an important element of the suspension cushion. Remember Harley Earl's "Y-job," arguably the first styling concept car? It was a huge 1938 Buick riding on 13" wheels. Since then, wheels have been growing larger and tires getting wider.

When you recount the many pioneering aspects of Corvair design, don't forget the wheels and tires. In the 1950s even race cars ran on skinny tall tires; the Jaguar D-Type won Le Mans three times in a row on 16 x 5 inch wheels with 6.00 tires. The Corvair was designed for 13 x 5.5 inch wheels with 6.50 tires. This was radical at the time, when Corvettes had 15 x 5 inch wheels. A unique new tire design was required. Later in the 1960s all performance cars went wide, and "wide oval" tires were the rage for styling if not actual performance. Wide tires do not magically increase traction, and they bring many disadvantages.

For the last 50 years the trend has been to wider wheels of larger diameter, with lower profile tires. This has brought us to ridiculous extremes. As hot-rodders say, "if more is better, than too much is just right." So now new cars have 345/30 tires on 20 inch rims, which is absolutely ludicrous for driving on our crummy potholed roads. I know this because in younger days I ran my Corvair on 205/50-15 tires which were radical at that time but now are quaintly ordinary. A compliant and comfortable ride requires some tire sidewall height, so wheels should not be so big, nor tires so short. My 1991 Audi 20-valve turbo, a stealth luxury beast, had 15 inch wheels with 60-series tires to give the expected ride comfort. But wheel diameter limits the size of brake that fits inside it, so those crazy Germans invented a disc brake with the caliper on the inside radius of the disc

so that it could be as large as possible inside the wheel.

Today, nobody tries to fit smaller wheels. Everything is bigger, wider, and flatter. Luxury cars come with 50-series tires on 20-inch wheels, so we just brace ourselves as we crash over those bumps in the road.




